



Why are bogs important?

Key Stage/Age group	KS2/3
Time needed for activity	15 – 30 minutes
Location	Indoors or outdoors

Context

This activity plan highlights the importance of sustainably managing our natural resources, focusing on bogs and wetlands and the multiple benefits they provide. Natural Resources Wales' purpose is to pursue sustainable management of natural resources in all of its work. This means looking after air, land, water, wildlife, plants and soil to improve Wales' well-being, and provide a better future for everyone.

This activity will help you deliver against current curriculum and will enable learners to progress in the way described in the four purposes of the Curriculum for Wales.





Objectives

By the end of this activity learners will be able to:

- Explain some of the reasons why bogs are important
- Describe which of those reasons is the most important to them
- Understand that bogs provide multiple benefits for people and the environment

Equipment and resources

Resource cards - Why are bogs important?

What to do

The activity can be adapted and carried out in different ways (see 1 to 3). It can also be used to introduce or consolidate learning on the topic of bogs, climate change and sustainability.

Ask the group why bogs are important and discuss their ideas.

- 1 Independently or in small groups, hand out a set of the resource cards and ask learners to order the cards from the ones they believe are the most important to the least important benefits that bogs provide. Discuss outcomes.
- 2 With larger groups, give each learner a card. In groups, ask learners to arrange themselves so that they stand in order of the most important to the least important benefits that bogs provide. Compare and discuss the similarities and differences between the groups.
- 3 Learners can work in pairs or small groups to sort the nine resource cards using diamond ranking. Ask each group to arrange the cards into a diamond formation with the most important card at the top, two cards in 2nd row, three cards in 3rd row (medium importance), two cards in 4th row and their least important card at the bottom. They need to get consensus as a group and can move the cards around until they reach an order which they all agree on.

Explain that there are no right or wrong answers. The purpose of the activity is to encourage discussion and for the students to learn that bogs can provide multiple benefits for people and the environment.

Key questions

- What do you think is the most important benefit that bogs provide?
- What can you do on a personal level to help conserve bogs?

Adapting for different needs/abilities

Less able

• Remove some of the cards from the set and concentrate on options 1 and 2.

More able

- Investigate if there are other benefits that bogs provide and add to the card set.
- Complete the activity including the extra card(s).





Follow up activity/extension

- Create charts and graphs to illustrate which reason was the most popular with learners e.g. create a human bar chart: lay the cards on the ground and ask the children to stand in front of their chosen card in straight lines to make the 'bars'.
- Use natural art to illustrate a way in which bogs are important.
