NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS

Villagers Arrange Excursion

RHOSGADFAN BAND ENGAGED.

NEWBOROUGH, Friday morning.

There have been no new developments in the dispute respecting Llanddwyn Island. The report exclusively published in last week's "Harold" respecting an incident in which Mr. Evans, the Newborough Postmaster, was alleged to have been roughly treated by Mr. Sam Jones, son of Mrs. Jones.

"Police Help"

"We don't mind people coming to the island if they keep to the paths," Mrs. Jones said. "The trouble is that people are claiming the right to scatter in all directions. This is very harmful to the bird life."

"I shall do all I can to stop it at the instructions of the society. I shall ask the police if necessary," said Mrs. Jones. Mr. Corwen, who owns the shooting and sporting rights of the island, told me: "It is a private island. I am responsible for the life of the island. I am a member of the Society for the Protection of Wild Birds, for whom Mrs. Jones is the keeper."

"I have never stopped people from setting foot on the island, but it now seems as though people are trying to take advantage of this privilege by deliberately deviating from the paths."

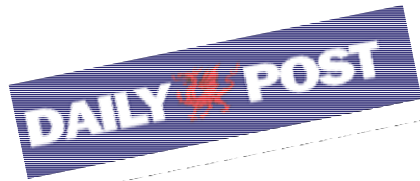
THE FUTURE OF LLANDDWYN

AMGYLCHEDD NATURIOL

Mae nifer o gynefinoedd pwysig ar Ynys Môn sy'n cynnwys rhostir isel ac arfordirol, corstiroedd, coetiroedd, a pherthi hynafol, yn ogystal â rhai o'r twyni tywod mwyaf yng Nghymru. Dyma un o gadarnleoedd rhai rhywogaethau prin, fel y Fadfall Ddŵr Gribog, y Wiwer Goch, Dyfrgi, Llygoden Bengron y Dŵr a'r Frân Goesgoch. Mae cynlluniau gwarchod mewn lle ar gyfer pob un ohonynt.

Mae 1 o'r 6 gwarchodfa natur leol ar Ynys Môn yn yr ardal yma sef **Twyni Niwbwrch ac Ynys Llanddwyn**.

Mae'r creigiau ar Ynys Llanddwyn ymysg yr hynaf yng Nghymru – wedi eu creu tua 550 miliwn o flynyddoedd yn ôl. Mae'r twyni yma hefyd yn bwysig iawn o ran bywyd gwyllt ac yn gynefin i fflodau tegeirian prin. Mae'r aber yn fan da i weld adar hirgoes, hwyaid a gwyddau mudol yn yr hydref a'r gaeaf.

Mae'r **wiwer goch** yn un o'r mamolion mwyaf prin yng Nghymru – mae prosiect mewn lle ar Ynys Môn ers blynyddoedd er mwyn cynyddu niferoedd. Bellach mae llawer i'w gweld yng **Nghoedwig Niwbwrch**.

Mae traeth **Llanddwyn** wedi ei wobrwyo gyda Baner Las sydd yn golygu ei fod ymysg y traethau gorau yn fyd-eang.



THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

There are many important habitats on Anglesey which include low and coastal heathland, fenlands, woodlands, and ancient hedgerows, as well as some of the largest sand dunes in Wales. This is one of the strongholds for some rare species, such as the Great Crested Newt, the Red Squirrel, Otter, Water Vole and Chough. Protection plans are in place for each one of them.

One of Anglesey's 6 nature reserves can be found in this area – **Newborough Warren and Ynys Llanddwyn**.

The rocks on Ynys Llanddwyn are amongst the oldest in Wales – created around 550 million years ago. The dunes here are also very important in terms of wildlife and are home to rare orchids. The estuary is a good place to spot wading birds, ducks and migratory geese.

The **red squirrel** is one of the rarest mammals in Wales – a project has been in place on Anglesey for years in order to increase its numbers. Many can now be seen in the Newborough Forest.

Llanddwyn beach has been awarded the Blue Flag which means it's amongst the best beaches in the world.



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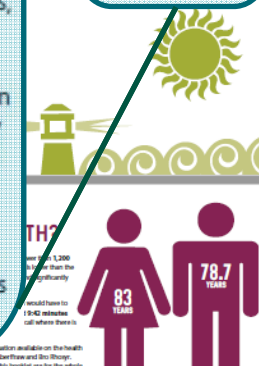
