

Welcome to Grogwynion Nature Reserve and Ty'n y Bedw Wood

A heavy metal river

The reserve extends along the Afon Ystwyth (river) where the open views along the floodplain contrast with the steep valley sides clothed with trees. Due to the old lead mines further up the valley, the river gravel is full of heavy metals which give rise to an unusual combination of heather, grass and gorse instead of trees.

The reserve is also interesting for its rare beetles such as the 5-spot ladybird, and spiders such as the wolf spider, which lives in shingle banks. This section of the river remains one of the wildest in Wales, frequently changing its course following floods.

What can you do from here?

Have a picnic, walk down to the river, or follow one of our woodland trails on the other side of the road.
